
# The Corona Virus explained for primary school kids





### What is the Corona-Virus?

The Corona-Virus is a new disease. First, people contracted the Corona virus in Wuhan. This is a city in China. It is yet unknown how the Corona virus was created and how the first patient got sick. Because people meet everywhere the first patient could spread the virus amongst other people. ### How to get infected with a virus

Viruses like the Corona virus are transmitted via droplets. But where do these droplets come from?

When someone has a virus, he or she is most likely to develop a cough and a cold. And if one coughs or sneezes, the viruses fly out of the nose or the mouth with the breath. In the breath are many little droplets which you can't see. But they are there every time! The droplets can fly up to 2 meters. And they fall down on everything that comes their way.

So, if a sick person coughs or sneezes at a healthy person, the healthy person can get infected. Moreover, many sick people have the viruses on their hands. This is how the virus gets spread on tables or doorknobs for example.

And this is why you can get infected by touching doorknobs or other things.

If you have the Corona virus, you have a cough but not always a cold!




## How to protect yourself and others from an infection?


